CDCTA Meeting Minutes: July 17, 2019

Meeting called ot order at 7:35 p.m.

In attendance: Leah Strid, Tesa Sterchi, Karen Atwill, Candace Kassel, Bill Wise, Karin Loftin, Beth Hussey, Amy Stapleton and guest Myles Strid

Approval of Minutes: Motion to approve June minutes by Tesa, Beth seconded and the motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: The account balance is \$7,015.75. Beth made the motion to approve the Treasurer's report and Tesa seconded.

Committee Reports:

Membership: The most recent number of members is 34.

Communications: The bylaws (2012) have been posted on the website.

Competitions: Debbie Hubbard will be Rosy's judge for the September CDCTA show and a Pas de Deux class may be added. The show will be on September 16, 2017 and Tesa will be the Show Secretary. Karen has heard good things about the shows held at Rio. The people she spoke with liked the grounds and said that the shows ran smoothly.

Education: Centered Riding grants have already been handed out to groups for the year. Leah looked into other options for grants but we didn't qualify for them. Interest has been shown in the Carol Wilson Clinic which will be held at Fox Run September 30- October 1. Beth will check on the necessary insurance and extra stabling could potentially be available. Sharon Rose will host Holger Bechtloff at Greystone on Oct. 14-15; \$160 per ride. Twillman's Feed Service in Fulton will have educational events about horses open to the public. Janice Dulak may be back at Fox Run this fall.

New Business: The Club hopes to create a welcoming atmosphere and would like to foster new memberships. 2018 is the Club's 30th anniversary. Beth talked about ideas for celebrating the event. A Prix St. George Jackpot with exhibitors and a large jackpot for the winner was an idea. They wouldn't be qualifying rides so they won't go on the rider's permanent record. A series of educational events or exhibition rides made available to the public were also mentioned.

to put it mildly, I am a lifelong lover of the horse, beginning when I could barely walk (according to my mother). When I was young, I was a western rider and competitor in games & team roping. As an adult though, I became interested in the hunter-jumper world. There were also cross country jumps where I took lessons, so needless to say, I soon had a passion for eventing, but as you know, the first phase of an eventing competition is dressage. For several years, my horses and I suffered through the dressage grudgingly, just to get to the *fun* part of eventing...the cross country jumping! However, slowly but surely, I grew to enjoy the challenge of dressage and to appreciate how it helps both horse and rider develop to be the best they can be. While I struggle to master the lower levels of dressage, I truly admire the horses and riders who manage to advance further up the training scale, and I love to watch them compete!

I've volunteered many times at the local level. There is a lot to be said for volunteering. Almost all shows at every level of competition depend on a fairly significant number of hard-working volunteers. Without these volunteers, many shows would not be as successful and many would not even exist. Volunteers are vital to the horse industry as a whole. Volunteers have many opportunities to help friends and other competitors, all while enjoying the added benefit of being able to watch & learn in an effort to improve their own riding skills.

My first experience with volunteering away from home, was the 2010 World Equestrian Games at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington. That was one of the most exciting experiences of my life and definitely opened my eyes to the opportunities available in return for a little of my time. Yes, I had a job there, but every day I got to interact with horse enthusiasts from all over the world, and every day I got to watch some of the best horses, riders and drivers in the world compete.

A few years later, in 2014, I was browsing an e-mail from the USDF, when a sentence caught my eye, asking for volunteers for the USDF Finals. Not only was it being held in the wonderful Kentucky Horse Park, but the USDF offered 3 meals a day, and a USDF jacket and ball cap for all volunteers and free lodging for those traveling more than a couple of hundred miles to get there. Wow, I didn't have to think twice. I called a friend and we signed up right away. We've volunteered every year since and plan to keep going each year as long as they'll have us.

Riders and horses (or should I say equines, because mules have also qualified), must compete in their areas, do well enough there to qualify for the Regional Finals, then qualify there to make it to the USDF Finals. Top qualifiers from all over the United States come to the Finals to compete from Training Level through Grand Prix freestyle in either Amateur or Open divisions. Volunteers get to experience the event from the inside, helping each other and spending the days and nights watching amazing animals and excellent horsemanship. We are greeted each morning by the smiling faces of the organizers as we get our assignments and proceed to the dining area for a nice hot breakfast. Then off we go to our assigned positions either in the Alltech Arena or outside where tests are being ridden in multiple outdoor arenas. Later, after breaking for lunch, back to work then break for dinner. Mealtimes are great, food is excellent and we all get to know each other and laugh and talk about the competition and our horses and ponies back home.

In between job assignments, volunteers are free to watch competition or to visit the barns and look at all the horses, ponies and maybe even a mule or two. Every breed and color imaginable can be found there and exhibitors are happy to discuss their journeys and share their experiences. Then there are always the vendors to visit, offering a wide array of saddles, equipment, boots and fashions from the practical to the luxurious. And last, but not least, the competition is held at the Kentucky Horse Park, more than 1200 acres in the heart of Kentucky Bluegrass country, featuring The International Museum of the Horse and many other attractions available for exploration.

I love seeing all the different breeds of horses, ponies and, yes, even mules from all over our country. There are imported horses, homebred horses, half bred horses and horses off Craigslist. In 2013, Laura Graves showed her 17H Dutch Warmblood, Verdades, in the USDF Finals. The very next year she skyrocketed to a fourth place finish at the 2014 World Equestrian Games in France. In 2014, at the USDF Finals, North Fork Cardi, a Welsh Cob stallion, 14'3 hands tall and ridden with a snaffle, wowed the crowd and the judges at the Finals and won the Grand Prix Freestyle. It's an amazing experience every year, and I leave full of positive emotions, from the sense of camaraderie and laughter shared with friends, old and new, the visions of performances witnessed, to the feelings of inspiration to try to develop a better partnership with my own horse. Each year, when the Finals competition is over, I am already looking forward to the next one.

Directions: Take I-70 west to exit 121 at Midway. Go 4 miles on Hwy. 40 to Rte. J. Turn right on Rte. J and go 2 miles to Rocheport Gravel Road. Turn left, the farm is 1 1/2 miles down the road. Stay to the left at the T and curve back to right, farm is on the right at top of the hill.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Except where otherwise noted, USEF/USDF and MHSA rules will apply.
2. The 2015 USDF/USEF Dressage tests will be used for classes 1-10. We are offering a limited number of the official USEF 2017 Western Dressage tests. Copies of these tests, as well as specifications for attire, etc., may be found on the USEF website (please bear with us as this concept is still new and will undoubtedly have some bugs to work out). The 2014 USEA Eventing tests will be used for classes 1CT-4CT.
3. All tests to be ridden in plain snaffle.
4. First-place prize and ribbons through sixth place for all classes. High score rosettes given to the highest score earned in Introductory, Training, First, Second, and Western Dressage, and to the best overall score in the combined test. TIP AWARDS: The Jockey Club is once again providing us with special awards for TIP- registered Thoroughbreds. Highest scoring TIP-registered Thoroughbred at the Intro Eventer level and at Training Level Dressage will each receive a TIP prizes. If entries warrant awards may be given at other levels. Smaller prizes for Reserve High Score TIP! Information on registering your Thoroughbred can be found at the end of this showbill.
5. A negative Coggins test, dated within one year, must be submitted with entry or must accompany each horse arriving on the grounds EVEN IF YOUR HORSE IS STABLED ON THE PREMISES.
6. RIDE TIMES: Will be emailed to all entrants who provide email address, or call 573-819-3773 (Tesa) after 8 p.m. on September 14.
7. NO DOGS PLEASE.
8. Casual attire is appropriate, but breeches, boots, and hard hats are mandatory.

9. No stabling is available at Sunny Oak Farms.

10. No entries will be scheduled until check is in show manager's hands. Late entries will be accepted after closing date until show is full for an additional \$10 late fee. SHOW IS OUTDOORS AND PARKING IS IN A FIELD; HEAVY SUSTAINED RAINS PRIOR TO OR THE DAY OF THE SHOW WILL RESULT IN CANCELLATION. IF SHOW IS CANCELED, YOUR CHECK WILL BE RETURNED. IF SHOW IS CANCELED, SHOW MANAGER WILL NOTIFY ALL ENTRANTS BY CELL PHONE BEFORE 7 A.M. ON SEPTEMBER 16.

11. Lunch concessions will be available on-site.

A FRIENDLY REMINDER: Remember that the maximum number of tests a horse/rider combination may enter in a day is 3.

NOTE NEW REFUND POLICY: Entries may be cancelled for any reason prior to midnight on closing date. Refund of all fees, less a \$10 office fee, will be mailed to you. AFTER MID-NIGHT ON CLOSING DATE NO REFUNDS FOR ANY REASON!!

PLEASE NOTE: CDCTA WILL CHARGE A \$10 FEE FOR CHECKS THAT ARE RETURNED FOR ANY REASON

For purposes of eligibility for all T.I.P. classes and awards, a "Thoroughbred" is defined as any horse that has been registered with The Jockey Club or a foreign Thoroughbred stud book recognized by TJC. In order to participate in a T.I.P. class or be eligible for a T.I.P. award, owners and riders must obtain a T.I.P. Number. The T.I.P. number card should be provided to participating horse shows as proof of eligibility.

* To obtain a T.I.P. number, please go to <http://tictip.com/default.asp?page=13>. There is no charge for a T.I.P. Number.

* You will need an Interactive Registration account in order to apply for a T.I.P. number. This is a free account which will also allow you to transact other business with The Jockey Club through our Interactive Registration (IR) system, www.registry.jockeyclub.com. If you do not have an IR account, please follow the prompts to sign up. Once you've gotten the account, you'll need to go back to www.tictip.com to apply for the number. If you do have one, please login.

* Click "Apply for a T.I.P. Number"

* Follow the instructions. Only enter ONE of the search fields (Horse name, tattoo OR dam name/YOB). Please use the Search/Submit buttons and be sure to populate each field. Do not hit "enter" to go to the next step.

o If you do not know your horse's registered name or pedigree, you can use the link that says "If you need assistance with identification, please click here" and fill out the email form for assistance.

* Once you have completed the application, please print a T.I.P. Card using the button to the right and present this at horse shows for proof of eligibility.

Make Your Horse Happy, Attend a Centered Riding Workshop

Carol Wilson, September 30-October 1

Centered Riding is a collection of techniques created by the late horsewoman, Sally Swift, to help riders achieve a more precise understanding of how to best communicate and connect with their horses under saddle. These techniques allow for a more “comfortable and freeing ride” for both the horse and the rider. Sally began developing the Principles of Centered Riding in 1967, when she was receiving therapy for lateral curvature of the spine and at 13 began riding to correct an overdeveloped right side of her body. At the time she realized that everything she was learning about correctly balancing each part of her body to walk, also applied to her riding, and she began incorporating these techniques fully into her teaching at the age of 62.

The Principles of Centered Riding apply to all horse riding disciplines. Making one’s horse a happy athlete is the goal. Carol Wilson’s centered riding clinic will be held on September 30-October 1 at Fox Run Boarding and Equestrian Events facility. It will benefit the English, western, hunt seat, saddle seat, cross country, eventing, dressage, jumping and trail riders. This is the second time Carol has been in the area, the last time at William Woods University, and a number of individuals attended this clinic back in 2014. Their experience and others who are planning to attend will be discussed briefly and hopefully encourage everyone in our local area to participate.

Harmony between horse and rider is achieved through knowing and controlling one’s body. Such body awareness is accomplished by riding with “The Four Basics”, which consist of the correct use of the eyes, breathing, centering, and building blocks. Sally uses many images to illustrate these principles to enhance the teaching of the techniques both on and off the horse, and so did Carol during her workshop. Although we only audited the workshop, we still found those exercises very beneficial to understanding the techniques of centered riding. We are thrilled to have the opportunity to review these exercises again, and Karin will also be able to participate this time in the riding portion of the workshop with her horse, Fritz. She hopes to improve her communication with Fritz using lighter and more meaningful aids.

Toni attended a clinic at Carol’s farm in Topeka and recollected a very useful exercise in which she played the role of a horse to illustrate how difficult it is to communicate with someone using only physical aids. She was rewarded verbally with “yes, good girl” when she moved correctly, but not told what to do. It took a lot of patience, but finally she was able to respond correctly. The actual task was to go and pick up her hat, carry it across the room, and put it on a particular chair.

Another rider, Chris, who loves to ride trails is looking forward to riding in the clinic one day with an English saddle and the next day with a western saddle. It will be interesting to determine if the saddle type makes a difference in the degree of communication and harmony between the horse and her. Tesa will be attending for the first time and is hoping to learn and apply centered riding skills to enhance her second level dressage training. Come and see how centered riding can assist you in reaching your riding goals with your equine partner by either auditing or riding in the workshop. See you there.


